

Reading, memorization, collection of materials and experiment are necessary and important. However, they are only means to the end. The final end of university education is to attain this exact thinking. If a student spends his university life without trying to attain exact thinking satisfying himself in gathering fragments of knowledge, he is not only wasting his time but he corrupts his mind. As the mind is made for exact thinkng, the habit for loose thinking is hurtful to the mind and ultimately to his whole person. Now, mind is essentially "social". In other words, communication is fundamental to the nature of mind. As George H. 
About 200 delegates from nine nations; the U.S.A., France, the Philippines, the Republic of China, Malaya, Hongkong, Korea, Pakistan and Japan, participated this year in the discussions, being divided into four panels according to their selection; Economic, Political, Social, and Cultural problems.

During the session they had some lecture meetings, local reportage, movie shows and mill survey to see the actual conditions of this country, while all getting together. It was closed succesfully in a friendly Amosphere on the evening of August 8, with the closing ceremony at Korakuen.

In connection with racial problems, which was most hotly argued among the Asian students, Mr. J. Wei, a delegate from Korea, said: "The relations between the Republic of Korea and Japan are not good. But there is no prejudice against the Japanese among the Koreans. They are matters of politics and diplomacy. We must not let it deteriorate our personal feelings. It is our duty to have more frequent meetings to exchange our information and views, whereby we can improve our relations. After all, we are so close to each other geographically that it is very important for us, the younger leaders of the future, to better our relations by all means."

Mr. Pesson, a French delegate, spoke through an interpreter as follows: "I had much interest especially in social problems, which are vital in our daily lives, for French students also think it attach much important to them. 

# **EAULKNER** AS HE IS

Japan well remembers the visit by William Faulkner, novel-prize winning American author, who is one of the best American authors of today and among whose many works "The Sound It is said that times are good and and the Fury", "Sanctuary" and "The Wild Palms," are the best read.

Faulkner spoke at the third annual American Literature Seminar held at Nagano from Aug. 1st to 21st on "Walt Whitman, Modern American Poetry"

On the last day of his stay in Japan, Prof. Yukio Suzuki of Engligh Literature at Waseda and a lecturer at talk with Faulkner over a luncheon at Chinzan-So in Tokyo. Mr. Yukio Suzuki gave the following as his impression of Faulkner.

"A shy and a difficult man to approach," he said. "He is truly a typical country man of America or we might say that he is just like a farmer who is likely to be seen in a Japanese village. In all his appearance, I could not feel anything of the so-called urban people of America we generally think
